Session 1 – Connections between social protection, employment, and the social determinants of health: Implications for epidemic and pandemic prevention, preparedness and response



Meri Koivusalo is professor of global health in Tampere University and codirector of the WHO collaboration centre on Health in All Policies and Social Determinants of Health. She has a background in research and analysis of global health and social policy, comparative research on health systems and health policy implications of decisions in other sectors. She has held expert and advisory positions for the WHO, European Commission, international nongovernmental organisations, and in Finland for Ministry of Social affairs and Health and Ministry for Foreign Affairs.



Etienne Krug is the Director of the Department for Social Determinants of Health at the WHO HQ. He leads global efforts to prevent violence and injuries. He oversees intergovernmental resolutions, the implementation of multicountry development projects, and advocacy campaigns. He chairs the International Organizing Committee for World Conferences on Injury Prevention, the UN Road Safety Collaboration and co-chairs the Executive Committee of the Global Partnership to End Violence against Children. Prior to the WHO, Dr Krug worked at the U.S. CDC, with Médecins sans Frontières and

UNHCR. He holds a medical degree from the University of Louvain and a Master's in Public Health from Harvard University.



Shahra Razavi is the Director of the Social Protection Department at the ILO HQ. She is a development economist, with more than 25 years of experience working on social policy, social protection, gender and development. Before joining the ILO in 2020, she was Chief of the Research and Data Section at UN Women, and Senior Researcher at the United Nations Research Institute for Social Development. She obtained a BSc from LSE, and MSc/PhD from Oxford University, with extensive publications on social policy, social protection, gender, labour markets and the care economy in a development context.



Erika Placella holds a Master's degree in History of Medicine from the University of Geneva. She specialized in Public Health with training from Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health and ICRC/WHO. With over 20 years of experience in public health and global health, she is currently the Head of the Global Program Health of the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC). Prior to the SDC, she worked for organisations in Africa, Asia and the Middle East on zoonoses, sexual, reproductive and child health, food security/safety and NCDs, including mental health. Her focus

encompasses primary healthcare and NCDs prevention and control in Africa, Asia, and Eastern Europe/Central Asia. She leads SDC's health and global initiatives while providing health policy guidance and strengthening SDC/Switzerland position in global health.



Sessions 2 – Social protection in epidemic and pandemic prevention, preparedness and response: lessons learned



Ramona Ludolph is a Technical Officer for Evidence-informed Policies in the Epidemic and Pandemic Preparedness and Prevention Department at the WHO HQ. She is leading the research pillar of the WHO Initiative to measure the effectiveness and socio-economic consequences of public health and social measures during health emergencies. Previously, Ramona worked in the WHO Department of Public Health, Environmental and Social Determinants of Health, developing guidelines and implementation tools related to urban health, healthy housing, clean energy use and social

protection. At the WHO Regional Office for Europe, she supported a regional network for evidence-informed policy-making.



Ernesto Jaramillo is a Colombian medical doctor with a PhD in Health Education from University of London. In his career he has covered clinical, programmatic and research issues in tuberculosis. Between 2002 and 2018 he was the tuberculosis drug-resistance policy lead at the WHO, an area in which he has published extensively, supporting the uptake of innovative policies in middle- and low-income countries. Since 2021, he is the lead for ethics/equity/human rights, social protection and disability at the WHO's Global tuberculosis programme department.



Lazarus Muchabaiwa is the Health Systems & Pandemics Financing Adviser with the UNAIDS Global Centre. Prior to the UNAIDS, he was a Senior Lecturer of health economics at Bindura University in Zimbabwe, where he led the development and piloting of one of Zimbabwe's first Community Based Health Insurance schemes. He also evaluated social protection schemes in Mozambique as well as undertaking HIV/AIDS NSP development and reviews; economic evaluations of programs in HIV/AIDS, GBV, nutrition, and WASH in several African countries. Salla Atkins is professor of Public Health (especially Global Health) at Tampere University, Finland, and also affiliated to Karolinska Institutet. She is an active member and advisory group member for the Health and Social Protection Action Research & Knowledge Sharing network. She has over 20 years' experience of research in low-, middle-and high-income contexts, on questions of social determinants of health and health equity, most recently with a focus on social protection as a key intervention. Her current collaborations include work with researchers in Mozambigue, South Africa,

Tanzania, Kenya, and India. She has over 100 publications in various forums.







Daxa Patel is the President of National Coalition of People living with HIV in India. Having worked in the field of HIV for over 20 years, she has been able to collectivise People Living With HIV (PLHIV), work with government, nongovernment, bilateral and funding agencies, and facilitate policy and legal change to protect rights and meet PLHIV needs. Ms Patel has had the opportunity to work at the international, national, and community level, which has helped her understand the epidemic from a range of perspectives. Being HIV positive woman Ms Patel strongly believes to empower community

members; to adress Social & Economic, treatment literate and stigma. To address this, she has worked on social protection entitlement advocacy with department, webinar on treatment literacy, skill building and job fairs, etc.

Sessions 3 – Design and implementation features of social protection systems that maximize their health impact and contribute to epidemic and pandemic

Sessions 4 – PPR financing, a catalyst for integrated social protection and health systems building?



Christine Brown is the Head of the WHO European Office for Investment for Health and Development. She leads a multidisciplinary team supporting European health networks, national authorities and partners to implement social, economic, gender and rights- based policies for health and health equity, as well as manages the WHO European Regional Health Equity Status Initiative. Benoit Mathivet is currently the Manager for Strategic Partnerships and Blended Finance as part of the Health Finance Department of the Global Fund where he promotes the use of innovative health financing instruments to leverage more resources for health system strengthening and the fight against the AIDS, TB and Malaria. Sessions 5 – Adopting a rights-based approach: why are legal frameworks key to coordinated prevention, preparedness and response across health and social protection systems?



Stéphanie Dagron is professor of law at the University of Geneva since 2016. She has a double appointment at the Faculty of Law and the Faculty of Medicine and she is attached to both the Global Studies Institute and the Institute of Global Health. Since 2022, she serves as the Director of the Master of Science in Global Health. Beginning in 2013, Stéphanie practices international law as a consultant for WHO, specializing in tuberculosis, human rights, research ethics and infectious diseases. She is also a member of the WHO Research Ethics Committee since 2019 and of the
